

IS YOUR PORN USE HEALTHY OR NOT?

IS PORN HARMFUL?

Watching porn itself is not directly linked with harm.

Porn can be harmful when people see it as a true reflection of sex in real life and internalise harmful messages seen in porn.

Porn can impact your view on consent, intimate relationships, expectations on sex and views on gender stereotypes.

People can also develop unhealthy patterns around watching porn.

WHAT'S THE ISSUE?

Porn can be a normal part of your sexuality and it's okay to be curious. 80-100% of Australians aged 15-29 have seen porn.

Some of the reasons people viewed porn included:

- curiosity
- masturbation
- education
- humor
- confidence
- sexual skills
- stress relief
- exploring sexual identity
- keeping up with peers

What is an unhealthy use of porn?

There is no one answer to this question. Instead, ask yourself, how is porn impacting your life? Is it getting in the way of your family, friends, school or job?

These may be signs that your porn use is unhealthy:

- You're watching more and more porn to feel satisfied
- It interferes with your everyday life, like sleeping or studying
- You get stressed or agitated when unable to watch porn
- You put off other activities to watch porn
- You need to watch more violent or extreme porn to get aroused
